Economy of scale

In today's economic climate, economies of scale can help communities.

In rural areas, groups and businesses can join together to buy in products or services at a better price than they could manage in individually. The supplier, in turn gets more business. This is a "win- win" situation.

It also keeps a supplier's transport costs down if several close households or businesses are booked in for one day, decreasing the environmental impact.

Present businesses involved are window cleaning heating oil providers.

Hopefully in the future there will be a greater number of companies that can offer a broader range of services. There is potential for more households to utilise the services already provided. Please contact the clerk if you are interested in getting involved.

An example of this already in action is the recent purchase of a plot of land on behalf of a Parish with the intention to turn it into a community-led green energy scheme.

Ditches

We have received a large amount of community feedback about the poor quality of some ditches in the Parish. The new Cats' Protection Centre has closed the road three times for under-road structures to be put in place. These were: sewage, mains water, and an attenuation tank water pipe. Planning legislation is very good at controlling what goes on at a site but there is little in place to check on the quality of work off the site. Local parishioners raised concerns that the ditches have not been properly reinstated after these works had been completed. It was brought to the attention of the site manager who arranged for the ditches to be fixed.

Cats' Protection Building

The centre will be the first of its kind within Cats' Protection to incorporate the latest learnings to meet the needs of cats, staff, volunteers and visitors alike. The new premises will have 65 pens for day to day care as well as 16 maternity and isolation pens, providing temporary accommodation for around 750 cats

each year.

Volunteers and staff will benefit from improved working areas and an enrichment garden will provide stimulation for the cats, who will be able to see nature and wildlife from their pens.

Volunteers will be wanted.

There will be opportunities for people from across the local community to join the existing team of cat-loving volunteers in roles ranging from those involving hands-on cat care to others behind the scenes in a more office-based or physical support capacity.



Centre Manager Mark Magee says, "The new centre will make a huge difference to cats, volunteers, staff and adopters alike. From the moment a cat arrives in care to the moment they go home, our trailblazing new centre will create the best possible experience for all involved."

This is a Loganair Embraer ERJ-145. Embraer is a Brazilian company that uses parts from all over Europe to build planes Its maximum speed is 520mph, range is about 2300 miles – Exeter to Tunisia. The aircraft weighs around 13 tonnes.

It has two Rolls-Royce engines mounted on

pylons on the rear section of the fuselage.

Bit over 20 years old; quite old for a commercial plane, but their service life is based on flying hours and general condition rather than age. A submarine's life is mostly determined by the number of times it has experienced the high pressure of great depth and then a return to surface pressure. Eventually this stresses the hull enough to weaken it. Planes seem to be a bit like that.


The unique "Loganair Tartan" has become entry number 11,744 on the official Scottish Register of Tartans.

There are fish in the river! Despite the ongoing water quality issues due to land run-off and sewage dumping, there were definitely small fish in the bit of river we own. The north west parish boundary follows the river under the old A30 and the grass area down to it (opposite the layby) gets cut, so you can access the water easily.

I mentioned seeing fish to Mike but, being a fisherman, he was not impressed and told me he'd seen trout 'this big' (about two feet) down there.

The whole valley upstream from us is supposed to become an important green space as towns are built around it. Seeing fish, of any size, offers hope that it is not too late.





5th November - Bingo


19th November - Quiz Night


