#### Who Owns the Village Field?

The Parish Council (PC) purchased the Field in 2014 from Devon County Council. The PC Chair, Lynne Askew, organised this and its cost was £1. Well done Lynne!

This means that the maintenance of the field and any play equipment is the responsibility of the PC – there is a cost. This is why it is important that we have volunteers prepared to cut the hedge, do some weeding etc. If we had to pay for all this work, the Field would become expensive. It also means that no one has to try and deal with Devon or East Devon councils to report or request something. The Field is a regular topic at Parish Council meetings.

There is nothing in law that requires playparks to be provided by local authorities and playparks handed over when new developments are built can be closed if they become considered 'unsafe'/underused/too expensive.

Basically, it is a miracle we have this Field in the condition it is in. Many play facilities around England (they are protected in Wales and Scotland) have been

lost.

But I am aware that children exist, get bored, and then create their own play areas in unsuitable places which tends to result in various types of nuisance and damage. But enough of my childhood reminiscences. A neat and cared-for paying field also makes the village look attractive and less like a place that may ignore wrongdoing.

So, even though I don't use the Field much, I still benefit from how it affects the village more generally. There are picnic benches, flowers to admire and a great view of the Red Arrows!

#### Build it and they will Play

We had to remove the ever-popular zipwire as we could not get it repaired. We tried to get a replacement, but legislation and insurance makes the installers worry about the slope we have on the Field adding to speed/danger. They would not be persuaded.

This leaves us with funds for the zipwire replacement that we need to buy a new piece of equipment with. Please let the PC know what you would like. We have no intention of pouring a lot of concrete, so no skate ramps or similar. The one at Cranbrook is amazing, go there. Get some real scars.

#### Who is the Field for?

As above, I think everyone benefits from it and anyone can use it. Planned activities require permission from the Parish Council.

However, the current Parish of Clyst Honiton will be reduced to the village road down to the Home Farm roundabout once the new town is built. The perfectly good farmland between the A30 and the A3052 will be populated by incomers who will have their own town council. It seems very unlikely that our parish will continue to exist as it will be too small to be practical.

The new town councillors would inherit Clyst Honiton's assets (including the Field) and then decide how best to look after them. East Devon have not attended any PC meetings to explain what their plans are for the remnants of our parish. They have been invited.

It seems very likely that our Field would be a running cost for a town council who could decide that their leisure provision is adequate and our

Field is too expensive and in the wrong place. It would be an easy decision to stop maintaining it.

There are many examples of local authorities disappointing residents with their decisions and, once there is a new town council, there is a considerable risk that residents of the remains of Clyst Honiton could find they have little say in what happens to our local green space.

#### Putting The Field in a Trust

Your Parish Council are considering putting the Field into a trust. This means it would be owned by a charity which would have a legal duty to protect the Field and only allow local residents to decide its fate. The Parish Council could be abolished, but the Field would remain an asset for those living near it. Not for councillors who have never even seen it to vote on.

The Parish Council is going to seek legal advice as we need to know there will not be any loopholes. Trusts like this have existed for over a hundred years for precisely this kind of thing and they work as long as they are looked after.

It needs at least three people to sign up to become Trustees. Given the shape of the future, they should probably only come from the village. It would not take up much time. Probably one or two meetings a year. There would be very little to do. The current Parish Council would carry on looking after the Field and dealing with practicalities.

In ten/fifteen years, I suspect that the Trust would be doing more to manage the Field, but that would be preferable to no one managing the Field.

We already have one volunteer potential trustee, we need at least two more. Very little is required at the moment, but the longer-term outcome will be significant.

Please do not assume someone else will do this. It is also essential that it is separate from the Parish Council, so we can't add it to our to-do list. We will help get this set up and running.

#### An Excellent War Record From Honiton Clyst.

THE above are the five sons of Mr and Mrs Wills of the Black Horse, Honiton Clyst. Wiliam, the eldest, was in the 9th Devons and has now been a prisoner of war in Germany for 18 months; Sid is in the Royal Naval Air Service; Jack is an acting Staff-Sergt. in the A.S.C., and has been in France since August, 1914; Fred is with the Devons in Mesopotamia; and Percy, the youngest, recently joined the Royal Marines.

#### Thanks for the clipping above, Grant, but what happened next?

William had received a shrapnel wound to his wrist before capture and spent 28 months as a prisoner. He was used as forced labour in a steelworks by the Germans who also at this point were running out of food. He survived this treatment, returned home unable to eat solid food for months and then took work as a motor engineer and later Greenslade Tour bus driver. He died in 1980, 93 years old.

Sydney also survived the war and worked for Greenslades. Terry Southern, from whom I am getting this info (Honiton Clyst Testimonials of The Great War) met him driving a school bus in 1951.

John (Jack to his family) also made it through unscathed. He had his own motor business and lived in a bungalow in Dog Village.

George demobilised in 1919 and ended up being the manager at Reid and Lee Motor Dealers, living in Exeter.

Percy had signed on for 12 years. We now know that the war ended 7 weeks after this article and so he was lucky. He had a bakery in Chulmleigh for many years.




#### ST MICHAELS HILL



## RESTORATION OF MARY'S CHURCH CLYST HONITON.

The parish church of Clyst Honiton, a pretty little edifice standing on its own ground, on the other side of the village, was opened on Thursday for Divine service, having been closed nearly twelve months for internal and external repairs, and the addition of a southe n aisle. The tower of the church was restored about three years since. and on the completion of the work it was determined to restore the Church itself. It was a very old edifice, con sisting of a nave and north aisle, and it was computed that to carry out a thorough restoration and erect a corresponding aisle in the south, would involve an expenditure of £1,200. On the movement being set on foot, one half of this sum was obtained as a donation from the Ecclesiastica Commissioners, and the landlords gave largely to raise the other moiety. Matters progressed so satisfactorily that in July the work was commenced, Mr. Wm White, F.S.A., (of London) being the architect, and Mr. Hunt, of Exeter, the builder. The galleries under the tower were removed, the south aisle taken down, and the building extended southward. The old roof over the nav was taken down and replaced, and the roof of he north aisle has been repaired and panneled. In addition to this, a new choir aisle has been obtained. Formerly the church was seated with high backed pews, which have now given place to open seats. The old pulpit, a very handsome place to open seats. The old parps, piece of workmanship, had fallen into a state of decay, piece of the state of decay of the sta and it has now been replaced by a new ne. The chief stone work used in the solid structure, and in the dressings, are sandstone and Bath stone, relieved by excellent patches from Ham-Hill. In the interior the roof is of pitched pine, which has also served for the pews. Being a Norman church the fabric has been restored in t e Perpendicular style of architecture. In its present state the building will seat about 120. Among the additions is a new organ (formerly the Church was without an organ), e ected by Messrs. H. P. Dicker and Son, of this city pass of the instrument is from C C to F, and it contains 54 notes, arranged as follows :-

The instrument is enclosed in a handsome poli hed walnut case, with decorated pipes in f ont. During the closing of the Church services have been regularly held in the National Schoolroom. Re-opening services were held on Thursday, together with some outdoor rejoicings in celebration of the event. The little village was visited by a large number of the clergy of the diocese, and the pro-

ceedings passed off satisfactorily

Divine service was held in the Church at 11 a m., when the neat little edifice was well filled. The musical portions of the service, especially the anthem, were admirably rendered, the choir being strengthened by some gentlemen from the City. Mr. Horwill, of Exeter, is the organist. Among the clergy present were the following:—Archideacon Woollcombe (Barnstaple), rchdeacon Earle (Totnes), Revs Preb Acland (Broadclyst), Preb Smith (Crediton), F Sterry (Poltimore), W T Davey (Stoke Canon), W F Gray (Stoke), F Pulling (Pinhoe), W Carwithen (Aylesbeare), Dr Dennett (Clyst St Mary), W J Beck (Rockbeare), J L L Fulford (Woodbury), W David (St Petrock's, Exeter), G B Hughes (Staverton but formerly curate of Clyst Honiton), and B Bullocke (rector). The prayers were read by the Rev W David. the Rector was the Celebrant, Preb Acland read the Epistle, and the Gospel was read by Archdeacon Earle The Archdeacon also preached, his sermon having reference to the value of intercessory work and prayers the end of the service a collection was made in aid of the Building Fund.




